Annexure III

Best Practice No. 1

- 1. Title of the Practice: Introduction of Language Lab.
- 2. Goal: The goal of this practice is
 - To provide an opportunity of learning languages to the students.
 - To provide an automated and easy to operate language teaching system.
 - To implement a teacher-monitored system to enhance the speaking ability of students in different languages.
 - To provide self-access for independent learning to students including access to resources outside
 of the class.

With a view to these aims, we have introduced the first language lab in the college with the help of Sanako Education India Pvt. Ltd, an organization that has ample experience to set up language labs worldwide over a number of decades.

- 3. The context: The College is situated in a place where most of the students are from Bengali medium background. Generally they have some difficulties in speaking foreign languages like English. But nowadays it is very important to be able to speak English in order to have a satisfactory job after the end of education; and therefore the college had a thought to provide a mechanism to them over a long time. Earlier, there were attempts to conduct the spoken English courses for the students; but a fully automated and well-instructed Language Lab can do a much better job in this regard. That is why this initiative is taken. The grant-in-aid by UGC helped us a lot to set the infrastructure up.
- **4. The Practice:** The room number 23 of the college, situated at the first floor of the Geography building is used for the purpose of the language lab. Thirteen computers with internet connection are accommodated in that room; all are having the Sanako Software installed and having headphone facility, so that the students can here the proper pronunciation of the languages and can speak accordingly. The room is large enough with adequate light, air and free space in it.

Due to lack of full-time Foreign/English language teacher in our college, the lab is currently under the instruction of Dr. Jolly Chatterjee, Assistant Professor of Geography.

- **5. Evidence of success:** We can site these scenarios as the evidence of success of the project:
 - The students of the college are encouraged and attending the lab.
 - They are having a steady progress in their English language speaking ability.
 - The guardians are also happy with the outcome, so far.
- **6. Problems encountered and Resources Required:** The major problem was the lack of Language Teacher. Till now the college does not have any full-time English teacher who can instruct the students in the lab. But the ability and willingness of other teachers resolved that issue.

The Grant-in-aid by the UGC is used as the source of fund to set up the infrastructure.

Best Practice No. 2

- 1. Title of the Practice: Introduction of Smart Classroom.
- 2. Goal: The goal of this practice is
 - To provide a source of learning to students through visualization.
 - To provide the basic steps of e-learning to the students.
 - To encourage the students and teachers to go for audio-visual aid based teaching-learning.
 - To cope up with the changing scenario of the modern education.

With a view to these aims, we have introduced the Smart Classroom (Basic) mechanism in the Small Seminar Room of the College.

- 3. The context: The College has a very large number of students. They are of heterogeneous levels of merit, understanding and participation in the class. In the normal lecture accompanied by Green Board, generic teaching aids etc. it is not fully possible to reach to all of them at the desired level. As the modern teaching science advocates for audio-visual smart classes that they are well-accepted to the students of all different levels, we planned to take the benefit of this modern technology and benefit our students thereby.
- **4. The Practice:** The Small Seminar Room of college situated at the first floor is used for the purpose of the smart class. A Computer with internet connection, an overhead Projector, microphones and sound amplifiers, a screen and a podium are provided in that room for this purpose. The students can learn using the audio-visual aids like presentations, videos, audios, etc. The traditional teaching aids are also provided there, in case of any need.
- **5. Evidence of success:** We can site these scenarios as the evidence of success of the project:
 - The students are eager to attend all of their smart class sessions.
 - Almost every day the room is busy, some activities are always going on there.
 - The feedback from the students and guardians also say that our stakeholders are adequately happy with this new addition.
- **6. Problems encountered and Resources Required:** We mainly faced two problems in this practice. First, at the initial stage all the users of the class were not properly aware about the use of the new tools, so there were some difficulties. But with the passage of time it is easing up. Second, at present we have only one room as smart classroom which is inadequate.
